

MALBEC TIMELINE





Malbec is originally from the southwest of France, where it is known as "Côt" and has a tannic, hard style. It was first introduced in Argentina by French agronomist Michel A. Pouget.

The first agricultural school in Argentina (Quinta Normal) was founded. Pouget was invited to run it in the hopes of adapting French grapes to the soils of Mendoza.



The phylloxera plague took a strong hold on France, causing serious problems with the wine industry of that country.

Argentina was one of the few regions, together with Chile and Cyprus, that remained exempt from phylloxera.



Towards the end of the 19th Century, Argentine viticulture experienced exponential development in the hands of Italian and French immigrants.





MALBEC TIMELINE



Malbec adapted quickly to the diversity of terroirs offered by Argentina's rugged landscape and began to produce wines better than in its original land.

Argentina became the only country to have original Malbec vines of true French heritage.





1959. With the creation of the National Viticultural Institute (INV), thanks to the work of pioneer producers, Argentine winemakers started to classify their vineyards, with wines first appearing labelled as Malbec in 1970.

1962. Malbec was the most planted grape in the country, accounting for 58,577 ha, or 22.5% of all vines.

1974. The first Malbec varietal for export is registered (United States).

1991. The Luján de Cuyo D.O.C, the first of its kind in Argentina is established to promote and protect the development of Malbec. It laid out a criterion of origin and style to enhance the taste of the variety.



2000. Argentine producers began to focus on origin, resulting in Malbecs that celebrate the identity of each *terroir.*





2011. The first edition of Malbec World Day is held. The 17th of April is, for WofA, not only a symbol of the transformation of Argentina's wine industry, but also the starting point for the development of this grape, an emblem for our country worldwide.










Map of Malbec (surface)













